THE STUDENT IS A KEY PARTICIPANT



- •Support and tracking of progress is a key component of senior schooling. For this to be effective, students need to drive their learning by:
 - Attending 90% attendance target
 - Wearing our school uniform with pride
 - Being prepared
 - Meeting deadlines (draft and final)
 - Applying themselves classwork, homework, study
 - Taking charge of their decisions goal setting, subject selections, tracking progress, engaging in opportunities e.g. school based traineeships/ apprenticeships, Uni visits, tutorials, Careers Expo



THE QCE



The Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) is Queensland's senior secondary schooling qualification. It is internationally recognised and provides evidence of senior schooling achievements.

The QCE lets you choose from a wide range of subjects and courses to suit your interests, further study and career goals

ACHIEVING A QCE



- Students must achieve:
 - A **set amount** of learning (minimum 20 credits)
 - Achieved at the **set standard** (e.g. a final result of a C standard or better, satisfactory completion, qualification completion)
 - Completed in a **set pattern** (a minimum of 12 credits from completed Core courses, up to 4 credits from Preparatory categories of learning and up to 8 credits from Complementary categories of learning)
 - Meeting the **literacy and numeracy requirements** (satisfactory completion of Unit 1 or Unit 2 of any General or Essential English or Mathematics subject in Year 11; satisfactory completion of Unit 3 and 4 in any General or Essential English or Mathematics subject in Year 12; or a final result of C or better in a Short Course in Literacy or Numeracy.

QCE SUBJECT TERMINOLGY



General Subjects (academic subjects with high levels of theory, a student must successfully complete a minimum 4 General subjects to achieve an ATAR)

Applied Subjects (practical based subjects with more hands on learning)

VET Qualifications (nationally recognised qualifications)

- •ALL **General** subjects have 3 internal assessment tasks and an external exam/s at the end of Year 12 (worth either 25% or 50% or your final grade)
- •ALL **Applied** subjects have 4 internal assessment tasks
- •VET certificates are a nationally recognised qualification. Multiple opportunities to demonstrate skills and knowledge. Competency-based assessment.

UNITS 1 & 2

- Formative units.
- Provide feedback to students on their progress.
- Between 2 and 4 internal assessments.
- QCE credits are awarded for satisfactory completion of each unit <u>individually.</u>

Note: subject changes should be considered after Unit 1 and will not occur after commencing Unit 3

UNITS 3 & 4

- Summative units.
- General Subject results based on:
 - 3 Internal Assessments +
 - 1 External Assessment.
- Between 25% and 50% externally assessed.
- Applied Subject results based on 2 to 4 internal assessments.
- QCE credits (2) are awarded if C or higher is achieved for <u>both</u> Units 3 and 4.

QCAA



The Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) is a statutory body of the Queensland Government.

The QCAA plays a critical role in the design and delivery of education in Queensland in collaboration with a range of stakeholders and partner agencies.

The QCAA issue students with their final Year 12 results and Queensland Certificate of Education, through their my QCE Student Portal.



Registering for the portal allows students to check their projected and awarded QCE points, access Year 12 results and resources to help plan for future pathways.

ATAR and QTAC



The Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC) provides a one-stop shop for 17 higher education providers in Queensland and Northern New South Wales, across both undergraduate and postgraduate admissions. Students must register with QTAC (or the equivalent in other states), if they would like to receive an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) and apply for tertiary entry.

ATAR is the primary mechanism used nationally for tertiary admissions and indicates a student's position relative to other students. ATARs are expressed as a number on a 2000-point scale from 99.95 down to 0.00 in steps of 0.05.

QTAC use information from the QCAA regarding a Year 12 student's final results to calculate a student's ATAR if they register and meet ATAR eligibility requirements. ATARs are calculated on Year 12 Unit 3 and Unit 4 work only.

SENIOR SECONDARY VET



Does VET contribute to my Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE)?

Yes VET also provides great practical skills for current / future workplaces

- Certificate I & II 2, 3 or 4 QCE credits contribute if the course is fully completed up to maximum of 4 credits
- Certificate III or above students can gain up to a maximum of 8 credits When a student completes or partially completes multiple qualifications from the same VET training package (e.g. Certificate I in Animal Care Industry Pathways and Certificate II in Animal Care, or a Certificate II in Sport & Recreation and a Certificate III in Fitness), credit accrued in the highest-level qualification in the Core category of learning will contribute credit, in the first instance, to a QCE. For the maximum credit to accrue for the highest-level qualification, at least 90% (or all but one of the units of competency) must be new learning

Does Vet contribute to my ATAR?

Only a Certificate III or higher contributes to ATAR calculations


EXTERNAL TRAINING OPTIONS

SCHOOL BASED TRAINEESHIPS AND APPRENTICESHIPS




School-based apprenticeships and traineeships (SATs) allow high school students, generally in Years 10, 11 or 12, to work for an employer and train towards a recognised qualification, while completing their secondary schooling and studying for their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) or equivalent. Students get paid to work while they train.

SATs help young people go places, whether that's a full-time job, a trade career, university, TAFE or other training.



TAFE at SCHOOL





If you're a year 10, 11 or 12 student you may be able to complete a TAFE Queensland qualification while you're still at school. Choose from a variety of certificate I to certificate III courses from a range of study areas ranging from hospitality to horticulture, early childhood education to engineering, and everything in between.

The TAFE at School program allows students to register for a large variety of Certificate courses not able to offered at school.

ACCESS ARRANGEMENTS AND REASONABLE ADJUSTMENTS - AARA



The QCAA recognises that some students may have disability, impairment and/or medical conditions or experience other circumstances that may affect their ability to read, respond to and participate in assessment. Access arrangements and reasonable adjustments (AARA) are designed to assist these students.

Access arrangements are action/s taken by the school so that a student with an eligible impairment that may not be covered by the definition of disability can access assessment.

Reasonable adjustments are action/s taken by the school so that a student with an eligible impairment as a result of a disability and/or medical condition and experiencing other circumstances creating a barrier to the completion of assessment can be assessed.

All students requiring an AARA must contact Mrs Clark as soon as possible – a medical certificate, or other documentation is required for AARA approval.

EXTERNAL EXAM PERIOD



The external exam period will run from 21st of October to the 12th of November (week 4 -7 of Term 4). Timetables are released in July.

If students miss an external exam there is no opportunity to resit or take a comparable exam. An AARA must be applied for and submitted within 7 days of the exam date for approval. Otherwise a student will receive a Not Rated for the assessment and will receive no QCE credit for the subject.

Students in all subjects should not be taking time off for holidays during Term 4.

HOW CAN PARENTS HELP?



- 1. Encourage your student to allocate time for **study each day**. Support your child to use this time effectively by:
 - a) Review your child's Student Planner and discuss how they are tracking.
 - b) Turn off any distractions e.g. computer/TV/music/social media.
 - c) Encourage your student to liaise regularly with class teacher about areas that they are struggling with.
 - d) Encourage your child to attend tutoring.
 - e) Take interest in their assessment tasks Don't do it for them ask questions, read drafts, listen to orals, encourage them to explain concepts to you.
- 2. Ensure you student has a work life balance e.g. hours of work/study/play in moderation.
- 3. Supporting good sleep e.g. device use.
- 4. If you student is ill or unable to complete assessment on the due date, collect appropriate documentation and contact the Senior Schooling Head of Department.
